COUNTY GOVERNMENT SURVEY 2019 SUMMARY REPORT

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County governments provide essential public services and influence local economies in important ways. Counties have more than 314 million residents and serve vast areas of the United States not served by municipalities or other general-purpose local governments (NACo 2019). Because they cover most of the national territory, counties play an important role in American governance as federal programs are devolved to state and local levels. Devolution, however, does not ensure the availability of fiscal resources or local administrative capacity. Thus, county governments face challenges to meet the rising demands for public services and economic development.

Researchers at The Ohio State University and Cornell University conducted a national survey to document the status of county governments in 2018-2019. This report compares county governments in four key areas: (1) public service provision; (2) economic development; (3) landuse planning; and (4) finances. Survey findings are reported for three categories of counties' locations: metropolitan, adjacent, and rural. *Metropolitan Counties* contain or are located within a region that has large urban cores. *Adjacent Counties* are nonmetropolitan (rural) counties located next to metropolitan counties. Small or remote *Rural Counties* are nonmetropolitan counties that are not adjacent to metropolitan counties or that have relatively small or no urban populations.

MAJOR FINDINGS OF THE STUDY INCLUDE:

- The services provided most widely by county governments are Law Enforcement (94% of counties), 911 Emergency Services (90%), Jails and Correctional Facilities (89%), Courts (87%), Road Maintenance (86%), Parks and Recreation (61%), and Senior Citizen Programs (57%). Rural governments are less likely than metropolitan governments to provide 15 of the 28 services documented in the survey.
- Fiscal stress is reported is reported as moderate or significant by more than half of all county governments. Governments in 51% of rural counties, 52% of adjacent counties, and 46% of metropolitan counties report reductions in state revenue as very important problem. Loss of federal revenue is also a very important problem for government finances in 34% of rural counties, 30% of adjacent counties, and 23% of metropolitan counties. A declining local tax base is an important source of fiscal stress in 46% of rural counties, 37% of adjacent counties, but only 25% of metropolitan counties.
- Economic development activities are engaged in by a majority (77%) of county governments. However, nonmetropolitan county governments are less likely than metropolitan governments to engage in economic development activities. Yet, where economic development activities are pursued, even rural counties report doing more not less over time.

- Arts-based community development, "creative place-making programs," are engaged in by a little over a quarter of county governments (27%). However, nonmetropolitan county governments are less likely to engage in "creative place-making" with only 18% of rural counties and 26% of adjacent counties, relative to 34% of metropolitan counties, developing these programs in their communities.
- ❖ Grant-seeking capacity is much lower in nonmetropolitan, both rural and adjacent, relative to metropolitan counties. Only 19% of rural counties and 22% of adjacent counties compared to 36% of metropolitan counties report having a grant writer on their staffs.
- ❖ Land-use planning, such as zoning and farmland preservation, is undertaken by a much higher percent of metropolitan counties than nonmetropolitan counties. Only 23% of rural counties and 28% of adjacent counties compared to 58% of metropolitan counties have a land-use planner on county government staff.
- A plan to deal with climate-related natural disasters (e.g., floods, drought, storms) were engaged in by 24% of county governments. Rural, adjacent, and metropolitan counties were about equally likely to have such plans in place. Efficient energy plans for the operation of county governments were adopted by metropolitan counties more often, 36% reporting compared to rural counties (19%) and adjacent counties (23%).
- The services county governments most often reported facing funding shortages for included Substance Abuse Support (36% of counties), Voting Machine Upgrades (36%), Public Defender's Office (32%), and Services to the Elderly (24%).
- ❖ Use of internet for communicating with the public still lags in nonmetropolitan counties. County governments in 77% of rural counties and 86% of adjacent counties have a website. This is in contrast to 93% of metropolitan counties who maintained a website.

DESCRIPTION OF SURVEY METHODS

COUNTY RURAL-URBAN CATEGORIES

Counties were assigned metropolitan, adjacent, and rural categories based on the rural-urban continuum codes developed by the Economic Research Service. The rural-urban continuum codes are as follows:

Metropolitan Counties:

- 1 Counties in metro areas of 1 million population or more
- 2 Counties in metro areas of 250,000 to 1 million population
- 3 Counties in metro areas of fewer than 250,000 population

Nonmetropolitan Counties:

- 4 Urban population of 20,000 or more, adjacent to a metropolitan area
- 5 Urban population of 20,000 or more, not adjacent to metropolitan area
- 6 Urban population of 2,500 to 19,999, adjacent to metropolitan area
- 7 Urban population of 2,500 to 19,999, not adjacent to metropolitan area
- 8 Completely rural or less than 2,500 urban population, adjacent to metropolitan area
- 9 Completely rural or less than 2,500 urban population, not adjacent to a metro area

Metropolitan counties are defined to include rural-urban continuum codes 1-3. Metropolitan counties are determined by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). Adjacent counties are defined to include codes 4, 6, and 8. Adjacency is determined by physical boundary adjacency and commuting flows. Rural counties are defined to include codes 5, 7, and 9. Codes are prepared in the Rural Economy Division, Economic Research Service, USDA (http://www.ers.usda.gov).

SURVEY PERIOD

Questionnaires were mailed in late spring 2018 through early winter 2019 to 3,052 counties in the 46 contiguous states that have functioning county governments. The two continental states that do not have county governments are Rhode Island and Connecticut.

KEY RESPONDENTS

Questionnaires were sent to a key respondent county official in each county government. The public official selected to receive the questionnaire varied by state, and was chosen by the researchers in consultation with staff at the National Association of Counties (NACo). NACo provided the survey mailing list.

SURVEY RESPONSE RATE

Rural counties: 300 (27% of responding counties). Adjacent counties: 368 (34% of responding counties). Metropolitan counties: 429 (39% of responding counties). Total responding counties: 1097 (a 36% response rate).

STATISTICAL SIGNIFICANCE

Differences are reported in the table below for the three county categories (metropolitan, adjacent, and rural). We denote those differences that are statistically significant at the $p \le 0.1$ level using a chi-square test.
