


RECOVERY CONTINUUM

FEMA Lessons Learned in Community Recovery

Keys to Success:

- Build capacity of all recovery partners (govt., nonprofit, private sector) to implement concepts in the NDRF
 - ✓ Build and maintain partnerships
 - ✓ Develop resources and expectations
 - ✓ Encourage information sharing
- Develop pre-disaster plans and guidance
 - ✓ Allows stakeholders to identify roles and responsibilities
 - ✓ Defines how coordination, decision making, prioritization and planning will occur
 - ✓ Adopt hazard mitigation principles
- Encourage and support local ownership, leadership, and management of the process
 - ✓ Foster community participation and collaboration in priority establishment and recovery vision
 - ✓ Promote participation and investment from all stakeholders
 - ✓ Provide opportunities for public comment and transparency



Sector Driven Themes

Community Continuity

- You must have a plan to establish strong social networks from the onset of disaster
- Ensure that vulnerable populations are accounted for – equity & social justice has been a major issue in every disaster

Infrastructure

- Majority of participants noted that infrastructure (utilities, communication, transportation) should be the first priorities
- Establish target timeframes for when services can expect to be restored to 50%, 75%, etc.

Healthcare

- Understanding interdependencies will be critical in ensuring healthcare workers are available (Transportation needs, daycare/schools, etc.)
- If healthcare services are disrupted, patients will not stick to political boundaries (neighboring communities should be prepared)



Sector Driven Themes

Economy

- Figure out now how to use local resources to leverage federal assistance
- Utilize hazard mitigation plans for redevelopment
- Build strong business to business and business to government relationships
- Develop workforce employment and support initiatives to help individuals stay and work in the community

Housing

- Leverage federal housing assistance and have a formalized coordination structure with local governments
- Streamline decisions and ensure they are aligned with the State's Growth Management Act
- Restore communities to be more resilient against future disasters



Next Steps



- Currently in our Research Phase (gathering all existing plans & conducting gap analysis)
- Operational Workshops will be sequenced according to priority starting with infrastructure
- King County Regional Recovery Plan will include operational tactics and formalized coordination structure
