THE COUNTY ROLE IN INFRASTRUCTURE


ounties are leaders In the nation's infrastructure system. Transportation and infrastructure are core public sector responsibilities that impact everything from our daily commutes to shipping goods around the globe. From building and maintaining roads and bridges to providing efficient transit options, counties are a driving force connecting communities and strengthening our economy. Counties also play a major role in other essential community infrastructure, such as airports, schools, hospitals, jails, courthouses, parks, broadband deployment, and water purification and sewage systems.




Counties own and maintain
44% OF AMERICA'S ROADS. In total,
1.8 MILLION MILES are countyowned roads, where the majority of
trips both start and end.



Counties are involved in the operation of **34% OF PUBLIC AIRPORTS**.



78% OF PUBLIC TRANSIT AGENCIES are county supported, including buses, trains, light rail and subway systems.



Counties support over **900 HOSPITALS** and invest in **90% OF JAILS**.



Counties own and maintain **38%** (**229,529**) **OF BRIDGES**—in 2018, 43,827 bridges were **structurally deficient**, **OF WHICH 53%** (**23,322**) **WERE OWNED BY COUNTIES**.

HOW COUNTIES INVEST IN AMERICA'S INFRASTRUCTURE SYSTEM

More than **\$100 BILLION** in community health and hospitals

\$61 BILLION in construction of public facilities such as hospitals, schools, jails, libraries, community facilities, and other local institutions

\$22.6 BILLION in sewage and waste management

\$134 BILLION in infrastructure and maintaining and operating public works

- A strong federal-state-local intergovernmental partnership that maintains local decision-making.
- Dedicated funding for locally owned infrastructure.
- Preservation of tax-exempt status of municipal bonds.
- Streamlining of the federal permit process while ensuring common-sense environmental stewardship.
- Bringing long-term certainty and solvency to the federal Highway Trust Fund.
