Partnerships for Opportunity and Workforce and Economic Revitalization (ARC region)

Makes available federal resources to help communities and regions affected by job losses in coal mining, coal power plant operations, and coal-related supply chain or logistics industries due to the changing economics of America's energy production and the coal economy

POWER INVESTMENT PRIORITIES

POWER AWARD TYPES

IMPLEMENTATION

\$400,000 to \$1,500,000

12 to 36 months*

Delivery of programming within a defined scope of work

Access to capital & broadband deployment projects have special criteria

PLANNING

Up to \$50,000

Up to 12 months

Development of plans, feasibility studies, etc.

Help lead to the development of a full implementation proposal





Mid to late February – RFP and LOI Release, application portal opens

Early March – Letters of Intent due

Late April – Full applications due, competitive

May thru June – review period

July – applicants receive a status update

July to early Sept – review with assigned ARC project coordinator

Early Fall – grant announcements

Application Process and Timeline



- Up to \$65 Million Available
- Match is required for all POWER projects
- In person workshops, Feb 23 (MS), Feb 28 (TN), March 2 (PA)

DOE: Clean Energy on Mine Land Provision Overview

This program will demonstrate the **technical and economic viability** of carrying out clean energy projects on current and former mine land

- \$500M, available through 2026
- Up to five (5) clean energy projects,
 with at least two (2) projects being solar
- Emphasis on economic development and environmental justice, lasting beyond chosen projects
- Projects must be geographically diverse

"Clean Energy Project" is 1 or more of:

- A. Solar
- B. Micro-grids
- C. Geothermal
- D. Direct air capture
- E. Fossil-fueled electricity with CCUS
- F. Energy storage, including pumped-storage hydropower and compressed air
- G. Advanced nuclear

Mine Land is defined as:

- Land subject to SMCRA or Mining Law of 1872
 - Active, inactive, and abandoned mine land
 - Coal on Public and Private land
 - Hard Rock on Public and Private (if tied to Mining law of 1872) land



Clean Energy on Mine Land Technical Assistance (Now Open!)

Receive no-cost technical assistance on developing clean energy projects on mine land.

Technical Assistance may include support with:

- High-level technology/pre-feasibility assessments
- High-level site readiness considerations
- Navigating project execution
- Navigating the permitting and interconnection process
- Community engagement
- Capacity-building strategies to support communityled projects
- Identifying opportunities for workforce and economic development



The goal of the Clean Energy on Mine Land (CEML) program is to enable widespread clean energy deployment by demonstrating the technical and economic viability of carrying out clean energy projects on current and former min land. Up to five clean energy projects will be carried out in geographically diverse regions, at least two of which will be solar projects. These demonstration projects are expected to be replicable, with the knowledge and experience obtained from this first set of projects inspiring other CEML efforts.

The Department of Energy's Office of Clean Energy Demonstrations has implemented a technical assistance program to inform decision-making on topics related to developing clean energy projects on mine land. Through thi effort, NREL provides no-cost technical assistance to communities and organizations that supports the development of successful, impactful, and replicable projects in line with CEML program priorities. These priorities are explicitly defined in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and include:

- Greenhouse gas emission reduction potential
- . Domestic, high-quality job creation (both directly and indirectly)

We created the Just Transition Fund to help communities overcome the economic challenges brought about by the coal industry's decline.

We launched in 2015 in response to President Obama's POWER Initiative with the express goal of strengthening and diversifying local economies by promoting inclusive, equitable economic opportunity. 

Federal Access Center

The Just Transition Fund's Federal Access Center (FAC) is a **one-stop resource hub** to help coal communities secure public funding for local economic solutions.

Launched as a stand-alone initiative in October, building and expanding on work and our long track record of success.

Our Funding Priorities



Community Economic Development



Workforce Development



Infrastructure (Broadband)

\$360 Million

To date, we've helped communities leverage \$360 million in public funding.

Federal Access Center Services

Application-Ready Support



Grants of up to \$75,000 to support costs associated with developing federal applications, including grant writers and match.



Technical assistance from experts who can review proposals before submission, provide guidance on program requirements, and more.

Early-Stage Capacity Building Support



Grants and technical assistance for early-stage project development, with the long-term goal of accessing federal funds.

Current focus is broadband – grants of up to \$150,000 and TA to help organizations access public funds to expand broadband access.

Informing and Coordinating with Federal Agencies



Share lessons learned with agencies about barriers for communities applying for federal funds.



Work with IWG and their Rapid Response Teams where there is geographic alignment.

How to Get Application-Ready Support

Eligibility

- 501c3 or local government* located in coal-impacted community
- Economic development,
 workforce, or broadband
 infrastructure project
- ☐ Plan to apply for federal funds in the next 6 months

Process

(6-8 weeks, with ability for us to fast track as needed)

- Submit Inquiry
 - Fill out 1 minute form with basic project information. Within 2 business days, you'll get an email to schedule an intro call with Natalie.
- Introductory Call
 We'll schedule a 30-minute call within a few weeks. On this call, we'll determine your eligibility to apply for specific JTF services.
- Submit Application

 If eligible to apply, we'll send you a 1 page application for a grant, technical assistance, or both.
- Receive Decision

 We'll provide feedback within a few weeks of receiving your application.
