DR. WARREN A. BROWN



Dr. Brown is Director of the Program on Applied Demographics (PAD), Senior Research Associate in the Cornell Institute for Social and Economic Research (CISER) and Research Director of the Cornell Federal Statistical Research Data Center. His public service has involved various roles working with federal statistical agencies. Warren currently is on the Board of the Association of Public Data Users (APDU). He previously served as a member of the National Academy of Sciences Standing Committee for Reengineering Census Operations, and on the Steering Committee for the American Community Survey Data Users Group. Warren's research interests

include methods of population projection; migration analysis; and integration of administrative records and survey data.

HON. LENA FOWLER



For 10 years, Fowler has served as the supervisor of District 5, the northernmost region of the county that includes Tuba City, Page, Kaibeto, Fredonia, LeChee and the Grand Canyon North Rim. Supervisor Fowler made history in August 2011 when she became the first Diné chairwoman of the board. She has since been re-elected Chair of the Coconino County Board of Supervisors for 2019-2020. In 2018, the Governing Institute selected Supervisor Fowler as one of 25 female elected leaders to join the Women in Government Leadership Program. Additionally, Supervisor Fowler currently serves as Vice Chair for NACo's Rural Action Caucus.

DR. THERESA PARDO



Dr. Theresa A. Pardo serves as director of the Center for Technology in Government (CTG) at the University at Albany. CTG works closely with multi-sector and multi-disciplinary teams from the U.S. and around the world to carry out applied research and problem-solving projects focused on the intersections of policy, management and technology in the governmental context. Pardo serves as Open New York adviser to New York State Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, and was recently appointed expert advisor to the Open Data 500 Project. She serves as international advisor to the E-Government Committee for the China Information Association and is president of the

Digital Government Society, a global multi-disciplinary organization of scholars and practitioners interested in the development and impacts of digital government.

CHRIS RITZO



Chris Ritzo is the Program Management & Community Lead for Measurement Lab, where he supports researchers, policy makers, advocacy groups and individuals interested in M-Lab's open Internet measurement data. Chris is a librarian and technologist whose research examines technology's impact on and use within communities, particularly within public institutions such as schools and libraries. His work is grounded in experiences within the maker movement, community organizations, grassroots media, cooperatives and community access television. Chris holds Master's degrees in information science and communication from the University of Illinois.

JUSTIN OLSEN



Justin Bradley Olsen is an American bobsledder who has competed since 2008. He won two medals at the 2009 FIBT World Championships in Lake Placid, New York with a gold in the four-man and a bronze in the mixed team events. Olsen's best event bobsleigh World Cup finish was second on three occasions in 2008–09. Olsen won a gold medal at the 2010 Vancouver Olympics in the four-man bobsled with driver Steve Holcomb.

Alex serves on the Center on Rural Innovation's data and mapping team, building tools that allow a range of stakeholders to surface insights and opportunities across sectors in rural America. In addition, he leads the implementation of a range of Future of Work related programs on the ground in CORI's pilot "innovation hub" location of Springfield, VT.
