POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION INSTITUTION TYPES

Post-secondary education institutions provide education beyond high school and offer rich learning and academic experiences for students. They also offer skills-based training for adults who are interested in a certain profession or trade. Four-year universities and colleges create a traditional learning environment that is rooted in academic oulture. Typically, students graduating from a 4-year institution obtain a Bachelor of Science or Liberal arts degree. Community or junior colleges typically provide students with a two-year education where they can obtain an associate degree or transfer oredits to a 4-year institution to continue their education.

Some graduate schools and 4-year universities have institutes of technology that specialize in in engineering, technology, applied science, and natural sciences.

Career and Technical Education (CTE) schools also offer students with an associate degree or short-term certificate of advanced education. CTE programs provide students with academic and technical skills, knowledge and training for gaining the necessary skills to be competitors in the job market and/or transfer credits to a four-year institution.⁽¹⁾ These programs prepare students for careers such




