Creative uses of ARPA Local Fiscal Recovery Funds for Homelessness and Housing

The Opportunity

Many of our **unhoused individuals are willing to work** – but not yet ready for traditional workforce programs

Employ 2 Empower offers a **unique combination of employment & support**, providing income, connections to housing and wraparound services, and pre-employment training





The model



- individuals living in encampments
- per week are paid

The Employ2 Empower program hires crews of 10 unhoused

Participants are trained to perform graffiti removal, illegal dumping abatement, and maintenance of public properties

Crews spend three days at work and one day receiving services such as housing placement, ID recovery, workforce training, and personal development coaching; all four days



Partnerships make it possible ...



Champion

An elected official/government entity with political will to champion the program and set the vision. The champion identifies funding, brings together the partners, and provides program support.

Non-Profit

Partner manages day to day operations, understands the population being served and is able to provide referrals to supporting services including permanent employment, housing and healthcare.

Law Enforcement

Partner assists with background checks, provides mentorship, job training and ensures abatement/traffic laws are being followed.

Total County-Wide expansion budget: \$2.1M



The Results

KPIs tracked include:

- Participants served
- Participants assessed for housing
- Participants placed into permanent housing
- Participants connected to ID restoration
- Participants receiving food stamps
- Participants connected to cell phone resources
- Participants connected to healthcare
- Participants securing permanent employment
- Participants connected to recovery services

Based on a successful pilot in Precinct 2, Harris County is expanding Employ 2 Empower **County-wide**, with target participation of 160 individuals

ARPA Investments in Affordable Housing

- \$7.5 M out of \$46.8 awarded so far: 16% of total ARPA funds
- Structured as pass-through grant awards to federal subrecipients
- Part of a holistic portfolio of other investments including: home repairs; household assistance; small business support; child care; K-12 education; mental health; community violence intervention & broadband infrastructure

Project Highlight 1: Deeply, Permanently Affordable Housing

- Development of 45 apartments which will be affordable in perpetuity, serving formerly homeless individuals and families
- \$749,000 award is supporting construction costs for West Haywood Street Apartments
- Construction completion expected by August 2023
- Subrecipient: Haywood Street Community Development

Project Highlight 2: Infrastructure to Support Homeownership

- Creation of 43 construction-ready home sites in the Glenn Bridge and New Heights developments
- \$1,600,000 award is supporting site development including sewer/water/stormwater installation as well as roads & sidewalks
- Infrastructure closeout expected by September 2025
- Subrecipient: Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity



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Project Highlight 3: Reimagining Deaverview

- Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) redevelopment initiative of Deaverview Apartments. Will result in 3 new buildings including 80 apartments for families with income at or below 60% AMI
- \$935,286 award is supporting construction costs
- Construction completion estimated by August 2024
- Subrecipient: Asheville Housing Authority of the City of Asheville







Project Highlight 4: Recovery Starts at Home

- Development of 120 units of new affordable rental housing at Lakeshore Villas for individuals and families from below 30% AMI to a maximum of 80% AMI
- \$3,263,847 award is supporting construction costs
- Construction completion expected by fall 2024
- Subrecipient: Mountain Housing Opportunities







Project Highlight 5: Buncombe Rental Assistance Collaborative

- Effective deployment of Federal Rental Assistance (FRA) to move over 200 individuals/families in Buncombe County into long term affordable housing
- \$356,571 award is supporting case management and landlord incentives to increase FRA acceptance rates
- Two-year project
- Subrecipient: Thrive Asheville
