



THIS WEEK'S TIMELINE:

- The text of the FY2022 Omnibus Package was released late last night
- The House is expected to vote on the \$1.5 trillion package today and send it to the Senate
- As a reminder, **government funding** is set to run out **this Friday, March 11.** Another short-term spending bill (CR) has been prepared in the event the Senate cannot pass the omnibus package by then
- Key provisions of the package include:
 - Defense spending would increase by \$42 billion, and non-defense spending would increase by \$46 billion
 - Another round of COVID-19 funding
 - Emergency humanitarian, military, and economic aid to Ukraine



KEY COUNTY PROVISIONS

- Increase in funding for Rural Development Housing programs such as rental assistance and loans for multi and single-family housing
- Additional investments in renewable energy development for our producers and rural small businesses
- **Decrease of \$170 million** in funding for the **Community Development Block Grant (CBDG)** that assists local governments in improving housing and living conditions, and providing community services
- Additional \$840 million for capitalization grants under the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and
 Clean Water State Revolving Fund
- \$75 million for Election Security Grants to improve the administration of federal elections, enhance election technology, and make security improvements as authorized by Help America Vote Act (HAVA)



KEY COUNTY PROVISIONS

- \$200 million in new and flexible funding through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to support the public health infrastructure and capacity nationwide
- \$100 million increase to the Mental Health Block Grant, which helps support services across the behavioral health continuum
- \$583 million in additional funding within the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and
 Children (WIC) program
- \$289 million increase in funding for Head Start, which funds local organizations- including county government agencies- to promote access to high-quality early childhood education among low-income children
- Increases funding to \$674 million for the Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program



KEY COUNTY PROVISIONS

- Increases the Federal cost share for FEMA's Public Assistance program from 75% to 90% for non-COVID related disasters from January 1, 2020 December 31, 2021
- Provides one-year of full, mandatory funding of the Payment in Lieu of Taxes Program (PILT)
- \$5.7 billion to the US Forest Service targeted toward hazardous fuel treatments and increased yearround staffing capacities
- \$550 million to expand broadband internet access in underserved areas, including rural areas
- \$102.9 billion for DOT to begin standing up new competitive programs established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, and fund new and existing transportation programs
 - Over \$1.3 billion in earmarks for highways, roads, bridges, airports and public transit systems



ARPA RECOVERY FUND RESCISSION

As outlined in the package, the \$15 billion in Covid Relief money will be paid for with unobligated ARPA Recovery Funds. Right now, the package would rescind \$7.05 billion of the total \$15 billion from the **STATE AND LOCAL ARPA ALLOCATION**, but **COUNTY ALLOCATIONS will not be rescinded**.

\$15 BILLION: BREAKDOWN OF COVID-19 RELIEF FUNDING REQUESTED

- \$10 billion for health efforts
- \$5 billion for international development for vaccines abroad
 - Paycheck Protection Program (\$1.904B)
 - Agriculture Programs (\$1B)
 - Aid to state and local governments (\$7.055B) State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund
 - Small business assistance from CARES Act (\$2.95b)
 - Department of Education (\$100M)
 - Dept of Transportation (\$2B)

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ARPA RECOVERY FUND RESCISSION

PROCESS FOR HOW FUNDING WILL BE RESCINDED FOR THE \$7.055 BILLION ARPA ALLOCATION

- The appropriations bill will start rescinding funding (\$7.055 billion) in the following phases states -> territories -> tribes -> counties/cities
 - Funds will be rescinded on the date of enactment of this Act.
 - o Counties are the LAST option to recoup funds from. The bill will stop at whatever level once it has rescinded \$7.05 billion
- \$350 billion total allocated under ARP for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund
 - \$240 billion has been disbursed by Treasury by 1/6/2022
 - Remaining funds total \$110 billion:
 - States, territories, tribes: \$25 billion
 - Territories: \$2.25 billion
 - Tribes: Total allocated was \$20 billion more difficult to find out how much is left, but in doing the math it could be around \$17 billion? Double checking that number.
 - Counties/cities: \$65 billion (second tranche)

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
