Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act

- H.R. 4601/S. 2405
- Key NACo priority
- \$250 million over 5 years
 - Competitive grants to states
 - Funds must expand CVSOs or similar local entities
 - VA must prioritize areas with high rates of veteran suicide, CVSO shortages, or high rates of Veterans Crisis Line referrals

ACTION NEEDED:

2022 POLICY BRIEF

Urge your members of Congress to pass the Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act (H.R. 4602/S. 2405), which would authorize federal funding to expand and strengthen County Veteran Service Officers (CVSOs).

BACKGROUND:

CVSOs are local county employees who are nationally accredited by the VA to prepare, present, and prosecute U.S. Department of Veterana Mfinis (VA) claims. Other, CVSOs are veteran's first point of contact in the community for accessing services. CVSOs assist veterans in accessing a range of benefits, including serviceconnected benefits, enrollment in VA health care, VA home loans, education benefits and available job placement assistance. Veterans are not always aware of the benefits available to them, and CVSOs are often the first to inform them about their eligibility.

CVSOs operate in 29 states and perform much of the VA's legwork for filing claims in their counties. This relatively small workforce is responsible for successfully processing nearly \$86 billion in direct compensation, pension, health care and other benefits for veterans each year. New qualitative research from the Center for a New American Security finds that disability compensation claims submitted by CVSOs are increasing in number and have a higher rate of success than those submitted by state-level and nonprofit.Veteran Service Officers. CVSOs are increasing in number and most frequent point of contact for veterans, family members and caregivers as they navigate the complex intergovernmental chain of veterans services and resources.

Though CVSOs' primary focus is helping veterans navigate the federal benefits system, these offices are currently funded almost entirely by counties, which creates challenges for areas with high demand or counties that serve veterans in rural areas. Local

resource constraints can significantly hinder the ability of county governments to expand our CVSOs staff and

Urge Your Members of Congress to Pass the Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach (CVSO) Act

The bipartisan CVSO Act (H.R. 4601/S. 2405) would strengthen county efforts to help veterans access federal service-connected health, pension and disability benefits. Specifically, the legislation would:

- Authorize \$50 million annually from Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 through FY 2026 for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to award competitive grants to states to strengthen and expand CVSOs or similar local entities, including hirring and training additional CVSOs
- Direct the VA to prioritize grants for areas with a critical shortage of county or tribal veterans service officers, areas with high rates of suicide among veterans, and areas with high rates of referrals to the Veterans Crisis Line
- Direct the VA Secretary to develop guidance for outcome measures related to the goals of increased uptake of veterans' benefits and increasing the number of VA accredited CVSOs in a given state

The CVSO Act would represent a historic federal investment in this key county workforce and help us better serve our veterans. This Veterans Day, please contact your U.S. Representative and U.S. Senators and urge them to co-sponsor and pass the CVSO Act. Adopted Policy: The National Association of Counties (NACo) urges Congress to pass legislation ensuring veterans who served near burn pits receive VA health coverage and disability benefits for associated medical conditions by eliminating or easing the direct service connection requirement and investing in additional research.

Adopted July, 2021







- Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act of 2021 (H.R. 3967)
 - Passed HVAC 14-11
 - 80 Cosponsors (77 Democrats, 3 Republicans)
- Comprehensive and Overdue Support for Troops (COST) of War Act of 2021 (S. 3003)

- Grant VA health care enrollment eligibility to any veteran who suffered toxic exposures while in service
- Create a list of presumptive disabilities (23 conditions) for veterans exposed to burn pits and other toxic substances
- Concede exposure to burn pits and other airborne hazards for veterans who served in certain areas
- Ensure VA adopts a framework to establish new presumptive disabilities for ALL exposures in a timely manner based on scientific data
- Develop a training module for VA providers and benefits personnel
- Require a toxic exposure questionnaire at the beginning of every VA primary care appointment





- Health Care for Burn Pit Veterans Act (S. 3541)
 - *\$1 billion over 10 years*
 - Less Comprehensive
 - Passed Senate unanimously

- Create a one-year enrollment period for VA medical care for post-9/11 combat veterans who served after 1998 and never enrolled
- Extend the enrollment period for all formerly deployed post-9/11 combat vets from five years to 10.
- Direct the Department of Veterans Affairs to incorporate toxic exposure clinical screening for veterans
- Mandate education and training for department personnel on identifying, treating, and assessing the impact of toxic exposure





Administration Pilot Program

- VA reviewing research into several rare cancers to fast track to health care and disability compensation for veterans
- Expanding training for VA and non-VA health providers.
